Recommendation 1: Increase the duration of summer programming to help improve program effectiveness.

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Recommendation 3: Continue to strengthen district-level recruitment strategies for summer programming.

Concur	<p>The process for identifying high school students in need of recovering or replacing graduation credit will strengthen the attendance of students with the highest need.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. School administrators and counselors will have access to a data dashboard customized for their school which identifies students who have failed a course. Training for staff members will ensure they know how to use the dashboard to sort and find their targeted students. 2. Additional training will build staff capacity in understanding the difference between the two programs (Central vs. Regional) in order to ensure that students both register for the correct program and understand the demands of the virtual option. 3. Schools will send targeted invitations to students/families with details that guide in correct registration and preparation for summer programming. 4. Central office will support the training, invitation template, and thorough communication about timelines, supports available, and all needed for communication to be successful. 5. A summer school website will include the necessary information for registration, program timelines, program descriptions, and one stop enrollment/payment links. 	Partially Implemented	3/1/2024
