Lights, Camera, FILM Literacy! Lesson Plan #10

Topics:

Journal Writing The Poor Little Rich Girl (1917) Vocabulary and Idioms Analyzing via Three Aspects of Film

Outcomes:

Students will follow organizational procedures.

Students will see and hear applicable vocabulary.

Students will apply the meaning of idioms used in the context of The Poor Little Rich Girl.

Students will read intertitles used in The Poor Little Rich Girl.

Students will analyze The Poor Little Rich Girl via the three aspects of film.

Materials:

Writing journals computer Post-it notes Chart Paper

Rating Literary, Dramatic, and Cinematic Aspects of Silent Film

DVD's: THE POOR LITTLE RICH GIRL

New Vocabulary: tyrant, grim, organ grinder, milestone, dismissed, dilemma, homestead, sacrilege, escapade, delirium, frenzied, ceases, distress, whirlpool, gingham

Sequence of Events:

I. Journal Activity (15)

Prompt:

What are your reactions to matching music to the emotions that you, as a filmmaker, would like your audience to feel?

II. POOR LITTLE RICH GIRL Intertitles: (30)

- 1. Tell students...
- "A composer named Phillip Carli wrote a musical score for the Mary Pickford you are now going to see."
- Remind students that in the PBS documentary, one of Mary Pickford's films was mentioned as being the most popular up to that time...THE POOR LITTLE RICH GIRL, adapted from the novel by Eleanor Gates.
- Tell students that **THE POOR LITTLE RICH GIRL** was selected in 1991 to be preserved in the National Film Registry at the Library of Congress. Less than 500 films are currently included.
- Tell students that to be totally prepared for this viewing experience, they need to understand the vocabulary and expressions on the film's intertitles.

HAND OUT: THE POOR LITTLE RICH GIRL Intertitles

Use the teacher notes to review with students the selected intertitles. (DO NOT read each intertitle aloud. Students will naturally read the skipped intertitles to themselves as you move through them.)

III. THE POOR LITTLE RICH GIRL (90)

1. Tell students that *THE POOR LITTLE RICH GIRL* is a longer silent film and that the Mary Pickford Institute, in order to reach out to a new generation of viewers, recently added BOOKENDS to the film. This is a beginning and ending that is not part of the story itself.

2. Tell students to notice the camera shots as they view the film.

DVD: THE POOR LITTLE RICH GIRL

IV. Three Levels of Film (50)

1. Direct students to rate *THE POOR LITTLE RICH GIRL* via the three aspects of film and comment on each category.

HAND OUT: Rating Literary, Dramatic, and Cinematic Aspects of Silent Film

2. Discuss student reactions on these three levels.

V. Reflection (15)

1. Direct students to the hanging chart paper labeled:

As a filmmaker, what did you especially like About THE POOR LITTLE RICH GIRL?

- 2. Hand out Post-its on which students write and post.
- 3. Review the comments on the Post-Its with the class, so students have a sense of what was learned that day. Make sure to clear up any misconceptions.
