Lights, Camera, FILM Literacy! Lesson Plan #8

Topics:

Journal Writing Three Levels of Viewing Film THE ADVENTURES OF DOLLIE Charlie Chaplin

THE KID (no sound, no music)

Additional Camera Shots

Outcomes:

Students will follow organizational procedures.

Students will see and hear applicable vocabulary.

Students will analyze "D.W. Griffith's *THE ADVENTURES OF DOLLIE* on three levels: literary, dramatic, and cinematic.

Students will analyze a Charlie Chaplin silent film THE KID.

Students will recognize additional camera shots used in THE KID.

Students will modify their original storyboards in pre-production.

Students will film new shots.

Students will re-edit their films.

Writing journals

Camcorder

Tripod

Computers with Editing Software

LCD projector

New Vocabulary: literary, dramatic, cinematic

Sequence of Events:

I. Journal Activity (15)

Prompt:

What are some challenges your group experienced while creating the one-setting silent conflict film?

II. Three Aspects of Film Production (30)

1. Introduce (review for LCL! students) these levels of analyzing film:

LITERARY (book, play, movie)-story, dialogue, character traits, character arc, motivation

DRAMATIC (play, movie)-acting, sets, costumes

CINEMATIC (movie)- camera angles, frame composition, lighting, music, "time jumping" via montage, flashback

2. Students rate D.W. Griffith's The Adventures of Dollie.

3. Discuss afterward.

III. Charlie Chaplin (20)

- 1. Have students guess in how many films Charlie Chaplin....
 - ... Acted 87
 - ...Directed 75
 - ...Wrote 61
 - ...Edited 56
 - ...Produced 35
 - ...Composed 17

2. Tell students that in 1992, a movie starring Robert Downey, Jr. was made about Chaplin's life. Show this 8-minute intro to learn a little bit about Chaplin. (Note: Song at the end SMILE was written by Chaplin.) http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=IUwg9P3EH4Y

IV. THE KID (60)

- 1. Watch Chaplin in a <u>totally silent</u> version of THE KID...no music. (Trust that students will adjust to no sound within the first five minutes due to the emotional nature of the story and to Chaplin's acting.)
- 2. As a class, analyze this movie via the three aspects of film production.

V. <u>Using More Camera Shots (60)</u>

- 1. Discuss with students camera shots not used in D.W. Griffith's films that were used in *THE KID*.
- 2. Allow students to add these additional camera shots to improve their own silent films. They redo their storyboards, film, and edit.

VI. Reflection: (15)

1. Direct students to the hanging chart paper labeled:

How did THE KID provide more ideas for early filmmakers?

- 2. Hand out Post-its on which students write and post.
- 3. Review the comments on the Post-Its with the class, so students have a sense of what was learned that day. Make sure to clear up any misconceptions.
